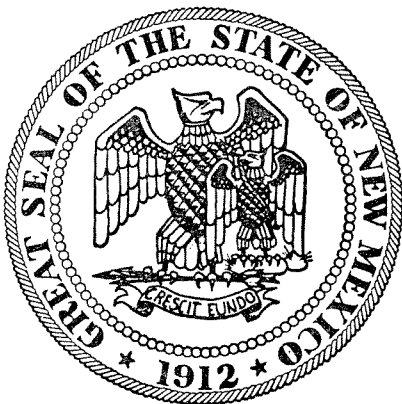
SENATE MEMORIAL 47, as amended

1 A MEMORIAL

2 REQUESTING THE NEW MEXICO SENTENCING COMMISSION, THE  
3 LEGISLATIVE FINANCE COMMITTEE AND THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE  
4 AND ADMINISTRATION TO COLLABORATE ON DEVELOPING A METHOD FOR  
5 MEASURING THE FISCAL IMPACT OF LEGISLATION THAT MODIFIES  
6 CRIMINAL PENALTIES.

8 WHEREAS, appropriations to the corrections department  
9 approached three hundred million dollars (\$300,000,000) in  
10 fiscal year 2008, representing an increase of more than  
11 eleven percent from the previous year; and

12 WHEREAS, since 1980, the number of adult prisoners in  
13 New Mexico has increased by more than four hundred forty  
14 percent, and the corrections department projects an increase  
15 of another thirty-seven percent by the year 2016, requiring  
16 bed space for approximately nine thousand three hundred  
17 sixty-five inmates; and

18 WHEREAS, the number of adult prisons has increased since  
19 1980 from one facility to twelve facilities, with a  
20 thirteenth facility under construction to house six hundred  
21 prisoners this summer; and

22 WHEREAS, despite additional facilities in Clayton,  
23 Springer and Albuquerque, the corrections department may face  
24 overcrowding sometime between 2009 and 2011; and

25 WHEREAS, the case loads of probation and parole officers

1 continue to increase, compromising public safety and offender  
2 rehabilitation and reentry; and

3 WHEREAS, in 2007, a law was enacted requiring real-time  
4 global positioning monitoring of all sex offenders on parole,  
5 which will cost millions of dollars in technology and  
6 additional personnel, and, although some costs were provided  
7 in a narrative, no fiscal impact was estimated for that  
8 legislation; and

9 WHEREAS, fiscal impact reports generated during a  
10 legislative session do not account for the fiscal impact of  
11 bills that increase or decrease criminal penalties, create  
12 new crimes, impose or remove mandatory minimum terms of  
13 imprisonment, require specific technology for monitoring  
14 probationers or parolees or modify the law in such a way that  
15 the time served in prison or on probation or parole increases  
16 or decreases; and

17 WHEREAS, there are computer models, research and data  
18 available that can assist in forecasting the fiscal impact of  
19 such legislation;

20 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE  
21 STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the legislative finance committee,  
22 the department of finance and administration and the New  
23 Mexico sentencing commission be requested to collaborate on  
24 establishing a method, if feasible, to measure the fiscal  
25 impact of legislation that increases or decreases criminal

1 penalties, creates new crimes, imposes or removes mandatory  
2 minimum terms of imprisonment, requires specific technology  
3 for monitoring probationers or parolees or modifies the law  
4 in such a way that the time served in prison or on probation  
5 or parole increases or decreases; and

6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the legislative finance  
7 committee, the department of finance and administration and  
8 the New Mexico sentencing commission determine what computer  
9 models, technology, research, data and personnel are  
10 necessary to enable the legislative finance committee to  
11 generate fiscal impact reports in a timely manner on  
12 legislation that affects criminal penalties; and

13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the legislative finance  
14 committee, the department of finance and administration and  
15 the New Mexico sentencing commission report the results of  
16 their study to the appropriate interim legislative committee  
17 during the 2008 interim; and

18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be  
19 transmitted to the chair of the legislative finance committee,  
20 the chair of the New Mexico sentencing commission, the  
21 secretary of finance and administration, the director of the  
22 legislative finance committee and the executive director of  
23 the New Mexico sentencing commission. \_\_\_\_\_
